


The post with the highest reach this week:



Condom lubricant is a good hair growth and skin treatment solution.

FACTS

- The World Health Organisation (WHO) <u>notes</u> that Silicone oils (polydimethylsiloxane), also known as silicone fluids, with viscosities in the range 200– 350 centistokes are the most used lubricants that are applied to male and female condoms during manufacture.
- While there is no evidence of adverse effects of using condom lubricants on hair growth or skin, Mr Costa Nkomo the Students And Youth Working on reproductive Health Action Team (SAYWHAT) Information Officer advises that the direct negative effects of this is the shortage of condoms which may lead to individuals engaging in unprotected sex and being exposed to Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) and unwanted pregnancy.



RECOMMENDATIONS TO JOURNALISTS

- **Produce features, podcasts and documentaries** featuring dermatologists and trichologists who can advise on affordable and scientifically recommended hair and skin treatment options that can be adopted instead of condom lubricants.
- **Producing local language features**, podcasts and documentaries that highlight sexual and reproductive health risks that may arise because of abuse of condoms such as shortage of condoms, and how such risks can lead to an increase in sexually transmitted infections due to people's failure to access condoms when needed.
